Kindergarten Options

- 1) All Day Every Day Kindergarten
- Public Acts 198 and 199 of 2012 state that children must be 5 on or before September 1st to be eligible for kindergarten.
- 2) Developmental Kindergarten
- For students that turn 5 between July 1—December 1.
 DK students will then attend Kindergarten the next year.
- 3) Pre-K program then Kindergarten the next year.



The Importance of Everyday Attendance Attend Today, Achieve Tomorrow!

School attendance, beginning in kindergarten, is a major factor in school success!

Why Attending School Every Day is So Important:

- Better Academic Performance
- More Work Options & Higher Earning Potential Later in Life
- More Positive Relationships/Friends
- More Developed Life Skills
- Happier Child!

Poor Attendance as Early as Kindergarten Leads to:

- A Pattern of Missing School and Work Throughout Career
- Being Behind Peers in Academics and Social Skills
- Increased Likelihood of Behavior Issues While in School and with the Law After School Age
- Less Opportunities
- Less Earning Potential

What kind of life do you want for your child? It all starts with coming to school every day! If you demonstrate that school is important to you, it will be important to your child! Set a good example from the beginning!

Developmental Kindergarten (DK)

- Your child must be age eligible for DK, which means, turn 5 years old between July 1, 2024, and December 1, 2024
- Parents interested in DK must have their child go through a mandatory screening
- Here is the link to sign your child up for the DK screening May 3, 2024, or scan the QR code: <u>https://www.signupgenius.com/go/5080C4AAAAC2BA1F94-4585514 development</u>
- Screening will take place at the Early Childhood Center (corner of Joslyn Road and Clarkston Road)
- The screening will consider social/emotional and a small amount of academics
- A district committee will meet to determine eligibility for each student going into DK
 - Parents will be notified of placement in DK, along with building location no later than the week of June 3, 2024

Toilet/Potty Trained

- It is LOCS district policy that your child be toilet/potty trained before the first day of school when attending developmental kindergarten or kindergarten.
- Your child should be able to use the restroom and clean themselves without adult support.
- Your child should be able to button/unbutton, zip/unzip their pants without adult support.
- Your child should not be wearing a "pull-up" to school, this is not being fully toilet trained.
- If your child has consistent issues with having bathroom accidents, you may be called to come and clean up your child before he/she can return to back to class.
- District staff will not assist a student with toileting unless directed to do so by a student's IEP or Section 504 Plan.

Lake Orion Developmental Kindergarten will provide children:

- a modified curriculum, taught at a pace dependent on individual readiness
- teacher-directed, child-initiated learning
- additional time to mature both physically and emotionally
- an opportunity to gain an understanding of the world around them.
- Transportation will NOT be provided for the Developmental Kindergarten program

Kindergarten Readiness

- Stephani
- Provide frequent opportunities for your child to socialize with other children.
- Your child should be able to separate from you without crying and distress. Going to school should be enjoyable.
- Your child should be able to sit and listen for about ten minutes. Practice by reading stories at home or listening to them on cd or lpad.
- Provide experience with coloring and drawing. Encourage your child to use crayons, pencils, scissors, and glue. Keep those little hands busy!
- Help your child learn to write his/her first name. Frequent practice is best, a few minutes at a time.
- Practice interactive reading with your child. When you read a story together, ask you child questions about the pictures, to predict what will happen and guess how the story will end.
- Work with your child on upper and lower case letters and sounds.

- Can rote count to 20
- Can identify letters of the alphabet and match letter sounds

- ► Is able to trace and/or write letters and numbers

- Can participate in group activities and is able to socialize successfully with other children









Interventionist

- Assess all students and Analyze data to provide targeted instruction that meets the needs of all students (based on 5 areas of reading: phonological awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, comprehension)
- Collaborate with Kindergarten classroom teachers daily
- Instruction is delivered in small groups (pull out) and/or within classroom
- Monitor the progress of students within my groups every two weeks to determine student achievement
- Use research-based interventions/strategies when working with students on a daily basis



Inquiry-based and student-centered, Bridges focuses on developing mathematical reasoning

In a Bridges classroom, students gather evidence, explain their results, and develop respect for others' opinions. Teachers encourage students to employ multiple strategies when solving problems.
