## Learning Options High School (AER)

May 18, 2018

Dear Parents and Community Members:

We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER) which provides key information on the 2016-2017 educational progress for Learning Options High School. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability and teacher quality. For the 2016-17 school year, schools were identified using new definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that has at least one underperforming student subgroup. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that has three or more underperforming student subgroups. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance is in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given.

Our school has not been given one of these labels.

Three key challenges for Learning Options High School, which is the alternative high school located within the Community Education Resource Center, are attendance, academic achievement, and graduation rate. The percentage of Learning Options students who scored proficient on the SAT and M-STEP is below the percentage of students proficient in the state in all subject areas. We have identified that a priority need was to focus on English, Math, Science, and Social Studies instruction so we can improve the academic achievement of all students. Another need is to improve the daily attendance rate for students. We believe that improving academic achievement and attendance will have a direct impact on graduation rates. Therefore, we have established several initiatives to improve and create student success in these three targeted areas:

1. This is the second year of implementing the Successful Student Program where each student is partnered with a mentor staff member in our program. Students meet with their mentors on a weekly basis and review their progress report (Successful Student Rubric-SSR) which summarizes their academic achievement, attendance, and behavior for the week. Students develop weekly goals and actions plans with their mentors. These SSRs are sent home for parents to review. If a student is not making adequate process, we increase the use of interventions using a response to intervention model.
2. The Student Support Team, which consists of all staff members, meets weekly to discuss students of concern and create goals and actions plans to increase success. We use a data-based problem solving model. Action items are created to support the student. Often, individual students are placed on academic or behavior contracts and plans to help improve overall achievement.

3. Attendance phone calls are made to parents on a daily basis for any student who has an unexcused absence. We also track attendance and send home a 5-day and 10-day absence letter. Once a student reaches 10 days absent, a student-parent-administrator meeting takes place to develop a plan for improvement. If the student does not improve, a referral is made to Oakland Schools Truancy.

4. To improve test taking strategies, all teachers embedded activities into their classrooms. We implemented writing across the curriculum and students were required to complete at least one writing task in the SAT format in each of their different classes. The majority of sophomores and juniors were enrolled in a SAT test prep course. The purpose of this class is to teach students strategies for test taking and how to become successful test takers. Additionally, it helps students become familiar with the test format so that they are more comfortable when the actual testing day occurs.

5. The staff has worked to align their instruction and use the district developed common assessments for all core classes. Our staff works extremely hard to differentiate instruction to meet the diverse needs of our students. Their lesson design and pedagogy grounded in the latest research on the most effective practices for at-risk students.

6. Academics are supported and enhanced by two full time learning support staff members. These staff members provide additional academic remediation to students in all subject areas as well as after school tutoring two days a week for one hour.

7. Students at Learning Options high school have the ability to recover credit using an online program called Edgenuity. Certified staff members monitor their progress, help students set goals, and review their submitted work to assign a grade. This program allows for flexibility so students can recovery credit and graduate on time.

8. We have partnered with the Genesee County ISD for Virtual Learning opportunities. Through this partnership (GENNET), we are able to offer hundreds of online class options through over a dozen online providers.

State law requires that we also report additional information.

#### *Learning Options and Student Enrollment*

Learning Options is an alternative education program that is designed to support students in grades 9-12 who have individual needs not being met in the traditional setting. We provide personalized educational services for students living within Lake Orion Community Schools as well as surrounding communities. We offer a day program, a part-time day/virtual program, and a full-time virtual program. The day program follows the same time schedule and calendar as Lake Orion High School. The full-time virtual program utilizes a completely computer-based curriculum for students who need more flexibility in the time, location, and pace of their education. Students work mainly off-site while being monitored by a certified teacher and school mentor. The part-time day/virtual program combines a schedule of both a day program and virtual program for a student.

Lake Orion Community Schools has expanded its Schools-of-Choice enrollment program to include out-of-district students for the 2016-17 school year. Spaces were available at selected elementary and middle schools (K-8) during the 2016-17 school year. Lake Orion also accepted Schools-of-Choice students in our Learning Options High School, an alternative learning environment for students in grades 10-12.

### *School Improvement*

2016-17 is the first year of operation for Learning Options High School and is not required to develop a School Improvement Plan in its first year. It is, however, a year of identifying goals and initiatives for future School Improvement Plans. The Board of Education authorizes and supports the formation of building level school improvement committees at each building within the district. Based on information gathered throughout the school year, the School Improvement Team looks at revising, eliminating or evolving current goals for the following year. Information gathered includes standardized test scores analysis, teacher observation, information gathered through survey or other devices for parent/student input.

### *Specialized Schools*

High School students have an opportunity to attend the International Academy. The International Academy is a public, tuition-free, high school of choice for students of 14 Oakland County school districts collaborating in consortium with university and business partners. Commencing with ninth grade, it provides a unique blend of rigorous academic standards and practical, career-related learning throughout the 190-day school year. Featuring the world-recognized International Baccalaureate as the centerpiece of its curriculum, it concentrates on preparing students for success past secondary education and the world beyond. Lake Orion selects ten students each year to enter the International Academy. The ten students are selected through a lottery held at Lake Orion Community Schools.

Juniors and seniors have the opportunity to enroll at Oakland Schools Technical Campus (OSTC). They will attend either the morning or the afternoon session along with students from Pontiac, Avondale, Rochester and Oxford school districts. Students will earn four (4) credits at Lake Orion High School and four (4) credits at OSTC per year. Bus transportation is provided for all students attending OSTC.

Lake Orion Community Schools also provides educational programs, services and support to certified special education students throughout the District. During the 2016-17 school year, there were 884 students who were in need of special education support services. From this group, 14 students required specialized services outside of the Lake Orion school district. Those students attended Waterford and Bloomfield Hills School Districts.

### *Curriculum*

Lake Orion Community Schools continues to implement a comprehensive curriculum for all students. The curriculum is based on and aligns with the Michigan Standards. ### *Local Assessments*

The 2016-2017 school year brought many exciting events and opportunities to Learning Options High School. Approximately 100 students attend Learning Options High School each year. Therefore, all students and staff at Learning Options High School participate in the Successful Student Mentoring Program where we develop these skills while developing positive, nurturing, and supportive relationships. Through this multi-tiered intervention and reward system, the majority of students are able to find success and graduate in time with their class.

Students at Learning Options High School meet all of the requirements of the Michigan Merit Curriculum and earn a diploma from Lake Orion Community Schools. Our students are also able to participate in elective courses offered at the Oakland Technical Campus and Lake Orion High School. All extracurricular activities and events at LOHS including sports, clubs, and the fine arts are also available for Learning Options students who wish to participate.

We are proud that our district, through this program, can provide students an environment where they realize their unlimited potential. We work extremely hard to meet the unique and diverse needs of our student population. It is our goal to instill a sense of pride and self-worth in each student. In addition, our specialized learning environment promotes greater accountability, participation, and overall success for all students every day. Learning Options High School is a well-established and proven program for students who would benefit from a more individualized learning opportunity.
