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Scripps Middle School Annual Education Report (AER)

We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER) which provides key information on the 2016-2017 educational progress for Scripps Middle School. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability and teacher quality. For the 2016-17 school year, schools were identified using new definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that has at least one underperforming student subgroup. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that has three or more underperforming student subgroups. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance is in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given.

Our school has not been given one of these labels.

Our ongoing challenge that we face within our community and building is meeting the needs of our at-risk population and ensuring they meet the academic, social, and emotional requirements to be successful at the high school level. We continue to work with our Learning Support Staff (LSS) to implement new strategies to meet the needs of our at-risk students. An additional challenge is to maintain our high level of achievement, as we proceed to a more standards-based grading and reporting system. Although the research behind such grading and reporting strategies is well known, making the shift can be difficult for all stakeholders. Through PD, staff meetings, and research our staff has made impressive steps towards developing a hybrid standards based model that will work for all middle level schools in LOCS.

State law requires that we also report additional information.

Description of Scripps Middle and Student Enrollment

Scripps Middle is one of three middle schools within Lake Orion Community Schools. Each middle school provides enrollment to those students living within the school's boundary. Scripps Middle houses grades 6-8 in which students are assigned to teams for their core academic classes (Science, Social Studies, Math and Language Arts). Throughout their three years in middle school, students develop new areas of interest through a variety of exploratory and elective classes including modern languages, art, computer applications, vocal and instrumental music, and physical education. Scripps Middle offers a wide range of clubs, sports, intramural activities and extracurricular activities.

Lake Orion Community Schools has expanded its Schools-of-Choice enrollment program to include out-of-district students for the 2016-17 school year. Spaces were available at selected schools in grades K through 8 during the 2016-17 school year. Lake Orion also accepted Schools-of-Choice students in our Learning Options High School, an alternative learning environment for students in grades 10-12.

School Improvement

The Board of Education authorizes and supports the formation of building level school improvement committees at each building within the district. The Scripps Middle School Improvement Committee is comprised of teachers from each grade level, the principal, support staff, and parent representatives. The purpose of this committee is to establish a purpose statement and goals for Scripps Middle School and to oversee the programs and activities leading toward the attainment of those goals. Building level decisions are made regarding curriculum, school improvement, staff development and evaluation as determined by this committee. School Improvement is a continuous process at Scripps Middle School. Building School Improvement Plans are reviewed annually and submitted to the State. School Improvement goals are comprised of content specific goals in the areas of social studies, mathematics, ELA, and science as listed below. These goals are measured and assessed based on our School Improvement Plan (SIP) and are continually monitored.

Goals:

- Goal 1: All students at Scripps Middle School will be proficient in Social Studies.
- Goal 2: All students at Scripps Middle School will demonstrate academic growth in science.
- Goal 3: All students at Scripps Middle School will increase student growth reading and writing.

Specialized Schools

Named a State of Michigan Exemplary Blue Ribbon School, Scripps has a wonderful balance of student productivity and warmth. The staff and students have helped create an environment that maximizes the potential of our middle school philosophy. Keeping student achievement and well-being at the forefront of everything we do here at Scripps, our staff is dedicated to our students and their success. Whether it is academics, after-school GAP programs, drama productions, athletics or music performances, our students take great pride in being a member of the Scripps community.

Our school district provides educational programs, services and support to certified special education students throughout the District. During the 2016-17 school year, there were 884 students who were in need of special education support services. From this group, 14 students required specialized services outside of the Lake Orion school district. Those students attended Waterford and Bloomfield Hills School Districts. Scripps Middle School has two classrooms that service autistic students.

Curriculum

Lake Orion Community Schools continues to implement a comprehensive curriculum for all students. The curriculum is based on and aligns with Michigan Standards for all courses and subject matter, and state-mandated graduation requirements. Local Assessments

At Scripps Middle we use a variety of qualitative and quantitative methods (in addition to M-STEP) to assess the whole child. Students are assessed both formally and informally in all classes using a variety of instruments including projects, performances and technology based presentations. Common assessments in mathematics, language arts, science and social studies are administered to all students.
